

DARTMOUTH'S BICENTENNIAL TIME CAPSULE

The year was 1950, and Dartmouth was celebrating its 200th Birthday. The Bicentennial Celebrations in the summer pulled out all the stops. An entire Bicentennial Committee was developed to create the best experience they could for the occasion.

The main events were in August, but some things started off a little earlier on July 31st. In particular, there was a Display of Antiques held at Greenvale School. The opening of this display began with a talk on Dartmouth history by local historian John P. Martin. It is very likely here, with antiques relating to Dartmouth's history, that the hopes and plans for a Dartmouth Museum Society began.

There was a huge Natal Day parade, many of the floats had congratulations towards Dartmouth reaching such a significant year in its history as a community. There was also an Open Air Market, and a Venetian Night on Lake Banook, this took place on August 8th, where many decorated boats glided across the water.

At the end of the festivities, a time capsule was made based on various materials produced for the

Bicentennial. These were sealed away carefully, and the plan was for the capsule to be opened in the year 2000, which would mark Dartmouth's 250th birthday.

However, things did not go entirely to plan. With the plan for Amalgamation of Dartmouth into the Halifax Regional Municipality in 1996, Then-Dartmouth Mayor Gloria McClusky thought it appropriate to open the time capsule for what was believed to be Dartmouth's 'last' birthday as a town. The capsule was then opened on July 30th, 1995, a few years earlier than expected.

Items that were found within the time capsule included:

- Posters of the "Old Time" Market
- · A promotional match-book
- 64 Photographs of Dartmouth
- Postcards of Dartmouth in the 1950s

While the Dartmouth Heritage Museum has several items relating to the Bicentennial event, the time capsule is now part of the Halifax Municipal Archives. They have an online exhibit that covers the events and the contents of the time capsule itself. We hope that you enjoy viewing their exhibit as much as what we have here within the collection!

COLLECTIONS CORNER: ARTIFACT HIGHLIGHTS

Hand Fans: The Hidden Art of the Unspoken Word

History

The hand fan (in fixed form) has origins as early as 3000 BC with use from the Greek, Romans, Etruscans, and Chinese. Folding fans weren't created until much later, and were adapted in Europe with inspiration from those brought from China and Japan. In the 17th century, folding fans began to gain popularity in Europe; the new folding fans typically belonged to royalty, whereas fixed fans were used by the bourgeoisie. By the end of the century, folding fans had replaced fixed fans.

During the Victorian Era, handheld fans were a must-have accessory to complete any delicate woman's outfit. Whether it be for a day in town, or a lavish evening ball among young socialites, there was a fan for the occasion. And, if you were a woman in the late 1800s, your fan may have even been your mouthpiece, conveying romance, mystery, or anything in between.

Fans In The Victorian Era

Some of the most lavish fans came out of the Victorian Era after a period of smaller printed fans. In the 1840s, fans were made of ivory or mother-of-pearl and vellum leaves, carved and painted intricately. Many featured paintings of flowers and birds on materials such as cotton, paper, or silk. Leaves also featured at times lace trims or embroidery. By the 1860s, fans were seen as fashionable and popular, with feather fans being the most sought-after by the next decade, especially those made with ostrich feathers.

Elaborate and intricately detailed fans complemented a woman's evening outfit, and simpler, more plain fans, could be carried during the day. However, fans were more than decorative accessories; an open fan... (cont'd)

hid blushes, giggles, and whispers, as well as crooked teeth, long noses, bad breath, and yawns. Of course, these devices could also be used to cool you down.

Furthermore, fans let women speak without saying anything at all. It is thought that fans had a language of themselves (though it's unclear how much it was actually used).

Here are some examples:

- To show displeasure to someone cruel: Open and slam your fan shut
- To say "I hate you": Draw your fan through your hand
- To apologize: Draw your fan across your eyes
- To say "kiss me": Put the handle on your lips

- To say "I love you": Draw the fan across your cheek
- To show you are married: Fan slowly
- To show that you love another: Twirl the fan in your right hand

Nowadays, handheld folding fans are much less common, gradually going out of mainstream fashion, as well as function, with the invention of electric fans and air conditioning. While modern day fans are much more practical, they can certainly never replace the multi-purpose elegance and beauty of hand fans.

After all, you can't lure in any potential suitors, or hide mysteriously behind a heat pump.

Welcome to The Gardens at Evergreen! Whether you're looking for a weekend picnic destination, or just a place to walk around and sit after a long day at work, our beautiful gardens are designed to evoke a serene and calm environment for all.

We also have a new and exciting arrival to our garden for better accessibility, (rolling down the hill is fun, but not for everyone) stairs!

Construction on the stairs began on the 24th of July, and should be finished by Mid-September, pending weather and events at the museum. Due to COVID-19, we have

had some delays, so fingers crossed that we won't be delayed further! The Rooms at Evergreen, located in the back right hand side of the gardens, are also available for groups to observe old tin-type photographs, weather permitting, on Friday's. Sometimes our photography volunteer, Dale Wilson, will have short demonstrations on photography, as well as creating art from cyanotypes. Contact the museum for more information on this, as there is a fee to produce images due to the time and precious metals used in the process.

Cyanotype methods were used mostly as a low-cost but effective way to create multiple copies of drawings; these prints became known as "blueprints," which engineers used well into the 20th century.








REFERENCE LIBRARY

INTRODUCING: EVERGREEN AUDIO TOUR

In an effort to make our museum more accessible, DHM has started implementing an audio tour. Throughout the museum you will now see several squares pinned up. The squares feature a unique QR code which can be scanned by your smartphone's camera. The code will take you to the corresponding DHM SoundCloud track, which you can then play. Knowing this technology may not be familiar to everyone in our community, we hope this brief overview will help. Our staff and volunteers will always be happy to help should further assistance be needed.

Our audio tour currently extends only to the main floor, but we hope to update it frequently as we are able. Currently, the audio tour does not include descriptive closed captioning, though we are learning and researching how best to create and include these.

STEP 1: FIND THE CODE

QR codes can be found on squares such as these, the first of which is directly inside the front doors:




STEP 2: SCAN THE CODE

To Scan the OR code, open your smartphone's camera and point it at the square. It can sometimes take a moment for the phone to recognize and read the code. If your phone will not recognize the code, it is possible you will need to



enable QR reading in your smartphone's settings.


