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# Message From the DHMS Board

### Maria Morris - The Art of Nature

The Dartmouth Heritage Museum has an extensive fine art collection. Included within this collection are original lithograph prints created by the Nova Scotian artist Maria Morris.

Maria Morris Miller was born in Guysborough, Nova Scotia in 1810. Her father was a merchant and her mother was a teacher. Both of her parents encouraged education for their daughter, in 1828 she was enrolled at Dalhousie University to study art, where it was noted that she had a particular talent for botanical illustrations. Her first prints were of Nova Scotia flowers that she began working on in 1834. Her work became well known throughout both Canada and England. In 1840, 30 of her illustrations were gifted to Queen Victoria, who was so impressed that she granted her royal patronage.

That same year in 1840, she married Garrett Miller, and the two of them would have five children. During that time, Maria stopped teaching and her art so she could focus on raising her family. By 1852 however, she returned to teaching art, and by the end of her life published 4 total albums of botanical art. The illustrations covered the native flowers of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Eastern Canada. Her fourth album was published in 1867, which was not only the year Canada was established as a country, but was also the year Maria's work was featured at the Universal Exhibition in Paris. Maria Morris Miller would pass away in 1875, at age 65.

During the course of her artistic career, Maria Morris Miller produced 99 sheets that depicted 146 species of flowers.

### MARIA MORRIS - THE ART OF NATURE CONTINUED...

Previously for the Gazette, back in the winter of 2022, I had highlighted a different local artist: Annie Blagdon Fairbanks. She was a versatile artist who created both collages out of local seaweed, as well as a piece of needlework that at the time I indicated was likely inspired by one of the works of Maria Morris. Specifically, the needlework appears to be after Maria Morris' illustration of the Moose Bush flower. I reflect upon the speculation I had at the time, where Annie Blagdon Fairbanks must have had access to these prints. In their article on Maria Morris, the Nova Scotia Museum noted that Maria's books were sold directly to paying subscribers. One wonders whether Annie Blagdon Fairbanks was one of these subscribers, or perhaps even a student at Maria Morris's school. It's moments like this, where we are left only with the art pieces left behind without knowing the full picture of how they may or may not connect, that I always find fascinating about my work here at the museum.

In The Peaceful Revolution - 250 Years of Democracy in Nova Scotia, author John Boileau traces the evolution of human governance in what is today the Canadian province of Nova Scotia. He focuses on the course of events leading to representative (1758) and responsible (1848)government in the colony, taking care to establish as his starting point acceptance by English King John, on June 15, 1215, of the Magna Carta. The timeline of the book runs through nine centuries, to the 2008 celebration of the 250th anniversary of the establishment of parliamentary democracy in British North America. Along the way, in twelve chapters, the reader is educated and informed of the winding path of government and politics in Nova Scotia, beginning with the Mi'kmaw prior to European arrival, through the Anglo-French settler and colonial periods, to confederation with Canada in 1867 and, ultimately, the political emancipation of women, racialized and other marginalised groups in the province.

Boileau elucidates on the evolution of democracy with sensitivity, clarity and panache, following a logical path that is easily understandable and, even for readers not consumed with a passion for history, simultaneously riveting and entertaining. The colonial conflict that characterised the period from the founding of Port Royal to the end of The Seven Years War, involving the French, Acadians, Mi'kmaw, and British, is covered in a manner that provides context to subsequent developments. The out-sized impacts on Nova Scotia society and politics of both the American Revolution and the War of 1812 are described, striking a useful balance between thoroughness and brevity. Internal to Nova Scotia's political development, Boileau highlights the

perspectives and actions of leaders and public figures of high moral character and abiding concern for the political, economic, intellectual, cultural and spiritual development of the colony. As well, the reader is treated to descriptions of those many persons in the colonial hierarchy whose motivations were in the main grounded in avarice, perpetuation of special privilege and ruthless self-promotion. Undoubtedly, both of these character types are active in our province to this day.

For this reader one of the most interesting facets of the book is the treatment by Boileau of Nova Scotia newspaperman and champion of English liberty Joseph Howe. For those of us whose knowledge of Howe was mainly gleaned in long-ago junior high and high school history class, The Peaceful Revolution fulsomely describes the outsize, indeed almost superhuman, role Howe played in the province's travel along the road to responsible government and eventual confederation with the Canadian polity.

At a time when the maniacal impulses of anti-democracy tyrants exert ever increasing influence over the wider world, it is important that Nova Scotians recall the difficult and time-consuming path to secure fundamental rights essential to a vigorous, productive, prosperous, innovative and compassionate society.


# Fairfield, Dartmouth Home of Joseph Howe

"Fairfield" was on Windmill Road at the foot of Dawson St. where the naval Armament Depot (CFB Halifax – Dockyard Annex) is today. It was at "Fairfield" that the Hon. Joseph Howe resided from 1863 to 1869 which were perhaps the most momentous years of his whole life, being the years leading up to Confederation and immediately afterward. A great deal of private and state correspondence from this time are dated at

"Fairfield". Howe was living at Fairfield when he made the decision to leave the Liberal party (Anti-Confederates) for the Conservative party. The property extended from the foot of Dawson Street north to Pelzant Street and east at least as far as John Street. This painting by Mary Graham and donated by Mrs. Robert Stanford is dated shortly before 1905 because in that year the old house was destroyed by fire. Long known as the "Joe Howe House", it was a landmark of the North Dartmouth. In Howe's time the owner of the Fairfield estate was Colonel George Pelzant Dawson, whose name lives on in the surrounding streets. The ship "Imo" rested all winter on a reef at the shore of the property after it collided with the "Mont Blanc" in 1917.





#### **Maple Parfait**

3/4 cups maple syrup 1 pint heavy cream 2 egg whites

Cook maple syrup until it spins in a thread (270 degrees F). Pour the syrup over the beaten egg whites until cold. Fold into the stiffly whipped cream. Place in freezing tray of Kelvinator. When frozen pile lightly in sherbet glasses and serve with sweetened whipped cream. Fills one tray. Freezes in three to four hours.
