This will ensure that this beautiful historic house, and part of the Dartmouth Heritage Museum collection, will remain to tell its important story to the community. Our volunteers have not been idle either, assisting with new banisters, painting, and gardening. Evergreen was a centre of Victorian social life, a house frequented by Joseph Howe; home to one of Dartmouth's most prominent Victorian men, Judge Alexander James; and later, home to Canada's First Lady of Folklore, Dr. Helen Creighton. It is used in many school and seniors' programs as a living history museum and a place where you can still find a Victorian elegance (and the occasional corset when the Director or Curator have a moment).



Recipes from the Archives

A Sort of Fine Pancakes:

Take six new-laid Eggs well beat, mix them with a Pint of Cream, a quarter of a pound of sugar, some grated Nutmeg, and as much Flour as will make the Batter of a proper Thickness. Curator's Corner

Over the past few years I have heard mention of a “debate” as to whether or not Dartmouth had an incinerator. Well, now we have proof. A copy of a photo showing the incinerator was just donated to the collection. A big thank-you to the donor, Joyce Foote, who kindly provided some research, which I will share with you here;

Dartmouth 1955-1960+

Looking back at the Incinerator and Crusher site:

Lyngby Avenue ended just past the intersection with Crichton Park Road. (In 1955 Lyngby ended at #38). Hillside Avenue ended at #18, and had not yet been opened up to Lyngby. Mount Pleasant Avenue started at #14, 12 & 10 at the corner of Hillside.

The road to the dump incinerator went up to the left off Crichton Avenue, on the second turn past where Lyngby now ends. The crusher site was on the east side of the present-day Crichton Park School driveway. The incinerator was further back; it is now the two soccer fields – the hill on the right side of Micmac Blvd and south-east to the filled in side of the dump. It ended near the parking lot of 1000 MicMac Blvd.

In the late 1950s local families often went blueberry picking where Lyngby Avenue ended, beyond where the school is today.

In the same neighbourhood, Hillside Avenue, Lakeview Avenue and Mount Pleasant Avenue are located on the former Keeler Farm. A road went up the hill on the north-east side to the Keeler home.

So, next time you're in the area of Lyngby Avenue, Crichton Avenue, Crichton Park School and the soccer fields, try picturing blueberry fields, an incinerator, crusher and dump instead!

DAMMSel Day – Locative Media Art in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia

Earlier this year I was selected as a Local Artist in Residence at the Centre for Art Tapes. I developed a locative media art project that was interactive and put into play Dartmouth's history, heritage and culture. Locative media art uses mobile technology, in this case iPhones, to connect participant to GPS Google maps and imbed digital files like photo, video, or audio into an application to be retrieved by the user. My intention was to reactivate historical artifacts from the Dartmouth Heritage Museum that were tucked away in their archives. With the help of Lisa O'Neill and Crystal Martin I chose twelve artifacts from their collection and wrote a fictional narrative based on the chosen objects. Among these were a whale's eye ball, Quaker shoes, a red umbrella, and a little revolver called the 'Baby Harmless'. Harry Chapman's book, 'In the Wake of the Alderney', also supplied me with some historical facts about Dartmouth like rum-running and whaling. My fictional narrative, which I entitled DAMMSel Day, was put to voice with the help of several actors whose dialog was recorded at the Centre for Art Tapes. In the end, participants experience the fictional DAMMSel Day by taking along an iPhone and walking to several sites in Dartmouth while listening to characters speak to them and each other about the events that unfold during that day.


Gifts of Literature


